

Overview

The purpose of this Health Equity Change Package is to support organizations through their health equity journey. This change package contains strategies and several resources that provide best practices, tips, and tools to help organizations advance health equity.

Steps to Consider to Advance Health Equity

There are many facets to promoting health equity: collecting race, ethnicity, and language preference and other data pertinent to understanding the patient population and the community, providing culturally and linguistically appropriate services, providing respectful and trauma-informed care, conducting screenings for social drivers of health and connecting patients with the appropriate resources.

Health Equity means everyone has a fair and just opportunity to be as healthy as possible.

Outlined below are several steps to consider to advance health equity within your organization.

- Understand your patient population and community use public information on your community or your patient population's data (e.g., race, ethnicity, preferred language, sexual orientation, gender identity, socio-economic status) to better understand your patient and community needs and preferences.
- 2. Use the data to stratify patient outcomes, including patient experience, to identify areas where disparities may exist.
- 3. Identify the drivers of these disparities by using quality improvement tools that help understand barriers and challenges (e.g., Fishbone Diagram).
- 4. Consider involving patients and/or caregivers in your plan to gather their thoughts and perspectives on specific strategies developed.
- 5. Perform a Plan-Do-Study-Act (PDSA) cycle and implement strategies that address the cause of the barriers identified.
- 6. Use SMART goals to monitor key measures and trends to assess progress.
- 7. Use the resources throughout this package to address some of the challenges/barriers identified (e.g., implement strategies that address the culturally and linguistically appropriate services to ensure that needs are met for a diverse patient population, use the tools on shifting language on ageism to improve patient experience within the nursing home).
- 8. Ensure that there is a plan to sustain momentum and address other barriers/challenges on a periodic basis, as they are identified.
