# Home Sweet Home

#### Step 1: Plan

Review the following Network and community resources to plan a patient engagement activity to provide an opportunity for patients to learn more about home hemodialysis and peritoneal dialysis as treatment options.

### Step 2: Take Action

Team up with your staff and PEERS in Action to complete a patient engagement activity.

- Talk with your PEERS in Action to discuss ideas on what resources and activities they would like to see at the clinic to educate patients on home treatment options.
- Create a bulletin board to share some of the resources available to help patients learn more about home hemodialysis and peritoneal dialysis:
  - Use the Home Dialysis Bulletin Board Kit to highlight the 10 benefits of home treatment
  - Debunk the myths about home dialysis
  - Share pictures from home patients of their home setup
- Play the videos on the lobby and/or patient televisions sharing patient stories about home.
- Review the MATCH-D with your team to identify patients who may benefit from more information about home.
- Encourage self-cannulation with in-center patients, which can give them more control over their care and prepare them for home hemodialysis.
