

Ideas for Supporting Patient Rights in the Dialysis Facility

The ESRD Conditions for Coverage (CfC) include a listing of patients' rights as part of the regulations guiding dialysis facilities^[1]. Inclusion of patients' rights helps patients feel more comfortable that the health care system is fair and works to meet patients' needs; gives patients a way to address any problems they may have; encourages them to take an active role in their health care; and it promotes a strong relationship between patients and their health care providers. Although the CfC's provide guidance, how facilities ensure that patients' rights are upheld can be challenging.

This resource reviews each of the rights listed in the ESRD CfC and provides links to Network resources and offers strategies to use to ensure that your facility is working towards supporting all patients' rights. Review the resource with your team as part of your efforts to improve the patient experience of care at your dialysis facility.

 18. Right to be informed regarding the facility's discharge and transfer policies. The patient has the right to: a. be informed of the facility's policies for transfer, routine or involuntary discharge, and discontinuation of services to patients; and a. receive written notice 30 days in advance of an involuntary discharge, after the facility follows the involuntary discharge procedures described in § 494.180(f)(4). In the case of immediate threats to the health and safety of others, an abbreviated discharge procedure may be allowed. The dialysis facility must prominently display a copy of the patient's rights in the facility, including the current State agency and ESRD network mailing addresses and telephone complaint numbers, where it can be easily seen and read by patients.
