
- <u>Home Baseball Playbook</u>. This toolkit was developed to help dialysis clinics "gamify" the process of transitioning patients to home treatment. It is a fun way to track patients as they "run" the bases with the ultimate goal of reaching "home".
- <u>Home Dialysis Lobby Day Ideas</u> and <u>Lobby Day</u> <u>Checklist</u>. These tools have been developed to help clinic staff and NPRs to plan a lobby day or bulletin board with a focus on home dialysis.
- <u>My Journey Home! Home Dialysis Passport</u>. This booklet was developed to help steer patients on their road to home dialysis, providing a tool to keep all your home dialysis information in one place.



Home Dialysis Central website has information on the basics of home dialysis, Life@Home with patient and caregiver stories and videos as well as message boards, news and research.



My Life, My Dialysis Choice is an online tool that will help patients to choose the right treatment for them by answering questions about their values and preferences. It is available in English and Spanish.



<u>Kidney School</u> offers online modules in English and Spanish for patients and staff. Module 2 focuses on Treatment Options. PDF versions are available to download.



Home Treatments Compared (handout) shows the pluses and minuses for each treatment option.



Method to Assess Treatment Choices for Home Dialysis (MATCH-D) was made to help kidney doctors and dialysis staff identify and assess patients for home dialysis therapies (PD and HHD).

Step 2: Act

Go For It! Team with your staff and Network Patient Representative (NPR) to complete a patient engagement activity.

- Talk with your Network Patient Representative (NPR) to discuss ideas on what resources and activities they would like to see at the clinic to educate patients on home treatment options.
- Create a bulletin board to share some of the resources available to help patients learn more about home hemodialysis and peritoneal dialysis:
 - Debunk the myths about home dialysis
 - Share pictures from home patients of their home set up
 - Highlight the 10 Benefits of Home
- Educate patients and staff by sharing the My Kidney Kit pages. Use the <u>My Education Sheet</u> to document any patient goals.
- Play the videos on the lobby and/or patient televisions sharing patient stories about home.
- Review the MATCH-D with your team to identify patients who may benefit from more information about home.
- Share information on self-cannulation encouraging patient in-center to consider it as a step for more control of their care and preparation for home hemodialysis.

Step 3: Share

Share what your clinic has done with the rest of the Network!

- Ask your Network Patient Representative (NPR) for their feedback and encourage them to attend the next NPR Connection Call (2nd Thursday and Friday at 1:00 pm CST) to share with others!
- Take a photo of your activity and your clinic's patient engagement activities at <u>Patient Engagement Activity</u> <u>Report</u>.

Three Levels of Patient Engagement

Level 3: Laws and Policy

"Consumers are involved in the decisions that communities make about policies, law and regulations in public health and health care."

Level 2: Organization Design and Governance

"Providers reach out for patient input to ensure they will be responsive to patients' needs."

Level 1: Direct Patient Care

"Patients get information and answer questions about their preferences to help inform their treatment decisions."
